H. <u>INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS AND ACTIVITIES</u>

All lectures will be presented live in the classroom and recorded for posting online. In-person students will attend live lectures and labs while online students will watch lecture recordings and complete labs on their own time.

Lectures will be held twice a week, ethics or case law assignments will be given once a week, and quizzes will be randomly given throughout the semester. Four projects will be assigned with two weeks to complete each project. Finally, a midterm and final exam will be administered.
